

Why is it important to talk with your children about drugs and alcohol?

- can protect them from participating in high risk behaviours as they get older.
- Demonstrates that you are open to having tough conversations and finding answers to their questions.
- Can influence their decision to experiment.

Direct and honest communication about tough topics will promote continued communication with your child.

Talking to your children about substance use

- Approach the conversation with curiosity and interest vs judgment and fear
- Model healthy behaviour
- Ask your child about their concerns and experiences and encourage questions
- Be honest about what you know, and don't know. Look up information together
- Promote trust by showing support and care
- Be clear on your expectations around substance use
- Connect them with a support worker if needed

Helping your children practice refusal skills

Practice refusal skills with your children so that they feel comfortable and confident in setting boundaries with peers. Examples of boundarysetting statements they could use:

- · No thanks, I'm not interested
- · I'm not drinking or using drugs tonight
- Sorry, I need to leave
- They could ask questions in response:
 - Why are you asking me to do
- · Deflect and redirect:
 - Suggest other activities to participate in

Safety planning for when youth experiment

Experimentation and pushing boundaries is a part of growing up, especially in the teen years. Youth want to assert their independence, which promotes learning from mistakes.

When you have conversations with your children about alcohol or other drug use, you can encourage your child to do some safety planning - what would they do if they were uncomfortable? Who would they call in a time of
